OUR VISION: SE/ALTC aspires to share its vision of a comprehensive community-based long term care service delivery system with quality options and choices for elders and adults with disabilities. We envision long term care services that reflect our nation's diversity and are accessible, consumer-friendly, supported, and valued by the community at large. SE/ALTC seeks to engage the public in the vision that a comprehensive long term care service delivery system is not merely an ideal, but a basic human right.

We envision a public that demands quality long term care services, not only for their children, siblings, and parents, but also for the friends, neighbors, and citizens of their communities.

SE/ALTC is a designated Area Agency on Aging. Area Agencies on Aging were established nationwide in 1973 as directed by the OAA to meet local needs of the nation's

aging population. SE/ALTC is primarily funded by federal and state dollars. A small percentage of its funding comes from entities such as United Way and from local donations.

SE/ALTC is responsible for planning, developing, and contracting for long term care services. We also provide Senior Information, Assistance and Case Management and Nursing Services directly within our service delivery area.

OUR HISTORY: SE/ALTC was created in 1973 to provide a variety of long term care services for the 60+ population. In 1995, SE/ALTC expanded its customer base to include adults with disabilities age eighteen and over. SE/ALTC serves adults with disabilities in our Respite Program, Family Caregiver Services, COPES, and MPC program.

ALTC contracts with other entities to provide home-delivered and congregate meals, in-home personal care services such as MPC, COPES, Respite, Family Caregiver Support, legal services, health screening, foot care, adult day care, adult day health, senior employment and senior transportation programs.

ALTC obtains local input on service delivery through a variety of ways. One source is an advisory council committee consisting of representatives from all eight counties (currently forty-five members). These advisory council members assist by making discretionary funding decisions for local areas, providing input into the area plan, and serving on long term care planning and development committees for special projects. They have also participated in quality assurance reviews of contractors.

OUR STAFF: SE/ALTC employs ninety-seven part and full-time employees located throughout our region. Of these employees, 87% are direct service delivery staff within the Information, Assistance, Case Management, and Nursing Services programs. The remaining staff members serve as SE/ALTC's administrative body.

OUR PARTNERS: The aging network includes the Administration on Aging, which is part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The designated Washington State department for aging issues is the Aging and Disability Services Administration (ADSA), within the Department of Social and Health Services. ADSA contracts with thirteen regional grantee agencies for local

administration of both state and federal funds. Grantees are selected by ADSA to establish staff and monitor an Area Agency on Aging. The grantee agency for SE/ALTC is Yakima County.

OUR AREA PLAN: SE/ALTC develops an Area Plan every four years, employing a variety of methodologies to obtain the highest level of stakeholder input. SE/ALTC must consider and plan for legislative agendas that impact older citizens and adults with disabilities. The purpose of the Area Plan is to direct the organization toward its vision. As well, SE/ALTC wishes to share its vision with the larger community, hopeful that they, too, will take part in a purpose that encompasses much more than SE/ALTC. An Area Plan update is compiled in the second year. This document is the update completed in 2009 for 2010 and 2011.

ALTC'S MISSION AND VALUES

Our Mission: To provide the highest quality community-based service and enhance the quality of life for those who use community-based, long term care services. We are responsible to manage, plan, coordinate, educate, and advocate for a comprehensive long term care system.
